 Structured, inquirybased, collaborative dialogue "How does this idea connect to...?"

"What different conclusions do you have?"

 Focused on a common text or resource

 Formatted to practice critical thinking, reading, and inquiry skills "You bring up an interesting point, and I also think...."



Socratic Seminar: Role and Responsibilities of the Participant

Before

- Analyze the text.
- Develop high-level discussion questions.
- Make connections between the text and knowledge.

During

- · Refer to the text and give evidence and examples.
- Actively listen and speak clearly.
- Open mind to new ideas and possibilities.

After

- Reflect on participation and the process.
- Reflect on the content of the Socratic Seminar.
- Set goals for improvement in the next Socratic Seminar.



Roles in a Socratic Seminar

 - Moderator (Teacher)
- Vocal Participants (Those who speak) supported by:
 - Wingman (Those who write down ideas) and stay silent



Roles: Wingman



- · Wingman/ Wing woman
- · Sits in the outer circle
- Sits quietly behind vocal participant
- Offers ideas for questions and comment on <u>sticky</u> <u>notes</u> (passes notes to their partner)
- Conference with vocal partner during breaks
- Is ready to switch roles (from outer to inner circle).


