

Political Activity by 4J Employees: Quick Reference Guide

Under Oregon law, a public employee cannot promote or oppose a candidate or ballot measure while they are on the job during work hours. However, public employees are not barred from advocating for or against a political position in their personal time and role.

Types of activities that are *allowed* and *not allowed* under Oregon law, regarding candidates or measures on the ballot:

Allowed	Not Allowed
 Discuss the current election and issues in appropriate subject area courses (judiciously). 	Advocate for your personal political views or preferred candidates in class discussions.
 Wear a button supporting a candidate or measure during work time (narrow exception; please be judicious about potential disruption). 	⊗ Use campaign slogans such as "Restore the Soul of the Nation" or "Keep America Great," outside of the narrow exception for buttons.
 Place a lawn sign in your yard at home or a car sign in the vehicle you park at school. 	Place a lawn sign on school property or an advocacy poster in a classroom (virtual or real).
 Endorse or advocate for a campaign on non- work hours, not in your official role. 	⊗ Use 4J email, equipment or facilities to advocate or allow a parent group to do so.
 Write a letter to the editor on non-work time, as an educator and community member. 	Write a letter to the editor during work time or in your official capacity as 4J staff.
 ✓ Advocate on social media on your own profile, device & time (remember you are a public figure!). 	Subset a 4J computer or network or official school profile for advocacy on social media.
 Participate in door-to-door campaigning and phone banks during non-work time. 	Subset work time for campaigning or ask other staff, students or volunteers to campaign.
 Make a personal campaign contribution in your own name to a political action committee. 	⊗ Use 4J funds for advocacy or political action committee materials (<i>e.g. making copies</i>).
 Encourage voter registration or share "Remember to Vote" materials on work time. 	Sencourage others to vote for or against X or share "Vote for X" materials on work time.
 Encourage high school students to vote. 	8 Encourage students to vote for or against X.
