Sentences and Fragments

After a hearty breakfast, Riley went to the park. = Sentence

A **sentence** requires a subject, a verb, and a complete thought.

A **fragment** is a group of words that does not express a complete thought.

Sentence	Sentence	
Tyler wasn't upset about losing his glasses.	Because he had another pair, Tyler wasn't upset about losing his glasses.	
Evan will buy a new computer.	If they are cheap enough, Evan will buy a new computer.	

Subordinating conjunctions like *because* join <u>two thoughts</u> in one sentence.

If a subordinating conjunction starts a sentence, it is still a sentence if it has two thoughts.

We can remember subordinating conjunctions with the acronym SWABI.
