## In most cases, capitalize the first word of a quoted sentence. This is true even if the quote starts in the middle of a sentence.



## If a quote in the middle of a sentence is not a complete thought on its own, don't capitalize it.



## **Recognizing pause before dialogue quotes**

Dialogue quotes are introduced by dialogue words like "said" and "wondered."

Readers naturally pause before a dialogue quote. The comma before the quote reminds us to pause.



Here are some common examples of dialogue words:

said	yelled	shouted
sang	thought	wondered
asked	announced	claimed

**Flow quotes** are different from comma quotes because they naturally blend (or "flow") into the text around them. The reader does not need to pause before a **flow quote**.
