The titles of long-form works are italicized.

Italicize titles of books, plays, newspapers, movies and TV shows, operas, and other long or complete pieces of literature or artwork.

The first **movie** Carolyn saw in theaters was *Beauty and the Beast*.

Lorenzo hopes to get the lead in the school **play**, which is *The Wizard of Oz* this year.

I loved **the book** A Wrinkle in Time when I was a kid.

The titles of short-form works go in quotation marks.

Quotation marks (" ") surround the titles of short stories, poems, journal and magazine articles, songs, fairy tales, and shorter works or compositions.

Ann learned about the eclipse while reading the article "Sun Blocker on Its Way."

Jeanette learned how to play the song "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star" on the piano.

Lonny thinks he could write a poem as good as "Fire and Ice."

Capitalizing and Formatting the Titles of Books

The entire title of a long-form work like a book should be italicized, **not** in quotes.

My brother reads **the book** Goodnight Moon to his stuffed animals every night.

Follow these steps to capitalize the title of a book:

- Capitalize the first word and last word of the title
- Capitalize all "in between words" except for the following:

FANBOYS (conjunctions)	for, and, nor, but, or, yet, so
Prepositions	of, in, on, at, to, as, by, with
Articles	a, an, the

Capitalizing and Formatting the Titles of Poems

The entire title of a short-form work like a poem should be in quotes, **not** italicized.

"Humpty Dumpty" is the strangest **poem** Donovan has ever read.

Follow these steps to capitalize the title of a poem:

- Capitalize the first word and last word of the title
- Capitalize all "in between words" except for the following:

FANBOYS (conjunctions)	for, and, nor, but, or, yet, so
Prepositions	of, in, on, at, to, as, by, with
Articles	a, an, the

IN QUOTES

During the intermission at the play Othello, Ella Fitzgerald bought me a cookie from the snack stand.

IN ITALICS

The fairy tale **Little Red Riding Hood** has made Eli nervous to be around wolves.
