- The use of the comma and the period in Spanish numbers is exactly the opposite of their use in English numbers. In Spanish, a period is used to separate hundreds, thousands, and millions. A comma divides whole numbers from decimals.

1.600.500	un millón seiscientos mil quinientos
510,25 ptas.	quinientas diez pesetas y veinticinco céntimos
6.320,80 ptas.	seis mil trescientas veinte pesetas y ochenta céntimos

- The numbers between 200 and 900 agree in gender with the noun they modify.

205 mesas	doscientas cinco mesas
1.700 pesos	mil setecientos pesos

- When speaking of 1,000, the article **un** is never used.

Gasté **mil doscientos** dólares. *I spent one thousand two hundred dollars.*

- When **millón** is used before a noun, **de** precedes the noun.

Un millón de personas.	<i>A million people.</i>
En la aduana, declaré dos millones de pesos.	<i>In customs, I declared two million pesos.</i>

ORDINAL NUMBERS

Used to Establish Order

Ordinal numbers specify the order of things in a series. In Spanish, the most frequently used ordinal numbers are those between one and ten.

Ordinal Numbers	
primero(a)	<i>first</i>
segundo(a)	<i>second</i>
tercero(a)	<i>third</i>
cuarto(a)	<i>fourth</i>
quinto(a)	<i>fifth</i>
sexto(a)	<i>sixth</i>
séptimo(a)	<i>seventh</i>
octavo(a)	<i>eighth</i>
noveno(a)	<i>ninth</i>
décimo(a)	<i>tenth</i>

Primero, deben ir a correos.

Está en el **segundo** piso.

First, you should go to the post office.

It is on the second floor.

- Ordinal numbers agree in number and gender with the nouns they modify.

los **primeros** tres meses

la **séptima** semana

el **cuarto** capítulo

the first three months

the seventh week

the fourth chapter

- **Primero** and **tercero** are shortened to **primer** and **tercer** before masculine singular nouns.

Está en el **tercer** piso
del nuevo edificio.

Es el **primer** presidente
hispano.

*It's on the third floor
of the new building.*

*He's the first Hispanic
president.*
